Though the roots of CCC's work stretch back to 1995 with the first Amy's Holiday Party, it was 2010 when the nonprofit organization was founded, with the same mission we serve today. In 2015, we transitioned from being a lay led organization to having Amy Zeide take on the full-time role of Executive Director. Throughout the following 8 years, CCC has been full steam ahead to expand as effectively and quickly as possible to meet the increasing demand and interest in our work. As a result, we have seen tremendous growth.



SO WHAT'S NEXT?

In 2022, along with extremely dedicated lay leaders, we embarked on a formal strategic planning process to truly take a step back and look at the bigger picture of the organization's future. We've been able to dream and plan for all the ways CCC wants to be intentional about setting new goals for the future.

As we look ahead to the next five years and beyond, our focus remains on upholding our mission. We will focus on maintaining our organization's authenticity and be purposeful in our growth to maximize the impact on our teens as well as the families we serve. And for CCC's continued evolution to be successful, we must also have a deep understanding of all that is – and is not – a part of that growth.

Additionally, we know that our organization's infrastructure provides the necessary foundation to sustain our development. With effective processes and operating functionality, CCC will be able to maintain the level of impact and overall quality the community has come to expect.

THE NUMBERS TELL THE STORY.

- In 2010, CCC's only program, Amy's Holiday Party, engaged 20 teen leaders.
- In 2015, CCC hosted 4 programs and had 40 teens participating in our Leadership Development Program (LDP) which met at 1 location.
- In 2022, we hosted 28 programs and had 274 teens meeting at 4 locations... and more than 600 Jewish teens have participated in LDP since 2010!
- And as you can imagine, to support the kind of growth CCC has experienced, the organization's infrastructure also expanded from 1 employee in 2015 to an 8-member professional team today.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BORD CHARLES BORD CHARL

My name is Jennifer Meyerowitz, and I've had a front row seat to CCC's growth since 2015 when I first became involved as the parent of a teen in the Leadership Development Program.

I remember sitting in a parents' meeting and listening to Amy as she told us what CCC was all about and being completely blown away by the multifaceted mission. The meeting had barely ended before I approached Amy and asked how I could help, not just as a parent, but as a professional. I wanted to participate and give back with my skill set and my experience. And I really wanted to help get more people involved!

Fast forward eight years, and here I am as CCC's Board Chair for 2023, and all three of my children have now participated in LDP – my youngest will graduate from the program this December. I continue to be so impressed by the intentional curriculum that our teens are learning in LDP. Yes, they're learning to be community leaders, connecting with other Jewish teens all over the city, and becoming engaged volunteers, but they are also learning to think beyond themselves during a stage of life where teenagers are typically completely self-focused.

CCC has accomplished so much in the last five years, including immense growth of our leadership program, expansion of our community programming, and increased fundraising to support all of the growth! In January, CCC welcomed Amy Forbes to our team as Assistant Program Director. Amy manages many of our community outreach programs (including GOAL Programs, Celebrations, and Support Programs), as well as our community engagement initiatives (including mitzvah sponsors, Smile Bag packs, and community drives). Amy comes to CCC from PJ Library where she served in a community engagement role overseeing local programming and events. Prior to that, she served in corporate strategy and marketing roles for several large corporations in Atlanta.

Additionally, our long-time marketing & communications consultant Meigan Brennaman officially joined our professional staff as Marketing Communications Director. We are excited that this change has allowed CCC to have a fully integrated and comprehensive approach to our marketing and communications efforts.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM MENTORS

In August, CCC held our first training session as part of a new Mentor Training Program. A critical component to the success of our Leadership Development Program, these Jewish young adult mentors are charged with facilitating the LDP curriculum through small group discussions and activities, serving as role models, and building relationships with our teens.

As LDP continues to grow, ensuring the quality of our mentors is crucial to making sure our teens have the most impactful experiences possible. Facilitated by our Experiential Education Director, Emily Yehezkel, the Mentor Training Program will equip each mentor with the tools necessary to work with our LDP teens, while also investing in their own individual Jewish and leadership journeys. Annually, the program will consist of two inperson three-hour trainings (held in August and January) and 8 additional one-hour Zoom sessions in advance of each LDP session.

Thanks to Emily's hard work in building this program, CCC also doubled the number of young adult mentors! Thank you to all the incredible mentors who served our teens in 2022.

For the final session of the Spring semester, CCC brought together all four locations of our Leadership Development Program for a inclusion training led by the Greater Atlanta Jewish Abilities Alliance. The session included a wonderful discussion and activities to help our teens learn about identity, language, learning styles, and ableism. These skills were then put into practice at our outreach programs where our teens worked with children of all needs and abilities across the community.





LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM FILL FUNDAMSEN

A vital component of our LDP curriculum, we know that learning to fundraise and create a pitch are essential leadership skills that will translate to all of our teens' future volunteer and professional positions. Some of you may remember that in previous years, the LDP fall fundraiser has been our Annual Phonathon.

However, in 2022, recognizing that each of our 274 teens brought different skill sets to the table, we expanded the fundraiser to give them the latitude to utilize their written expression and creativity skills, as well. In addition to phone calls, teens were taught to use a variety of tools such as email and social media campaigns or building their own fundraiser (like a bake sale or a car wash) to accomplish their goal. As usual, the teens impressed us with their ideas and did an outstanding job raising money on CCC's behalf.

PROGRAM ENDSON





In 2022, CCC increased our number of programs by 75 percent!

This increase not only allowed CCC to better support our partner organizations, but also ensured that we could create enough volunteer opportunities for the record-breaking 274 teens who joined our 2022 Leadership Development Program cohort.

Additionally, CCC worked to expand our roster of program partners. CCC's overall goal is to engage with organizations who are focused on supporting children and families in two focus areas: education & academics or housing & food-insecurity. To this end, we welcomed two new program partners in 2022, including Solidarity Sandy Springs, a community food pantry founded during the pandemic, and Nicholas House, an Atlanta shelter that provides housing to homeless families regardless of family makeup.

ACHIEVEMENTS

In 2022, we redefined the types of community programs CCC hosts to create clear categories that strengthen our dual mission's focus areas. In addition to our GOAL Programs (our smallest programs designed to provide more 1:1 experiences for our teen volunteers and the children we serve) and our Festivals (our largest programs, designed to promote large-scale community-building and support the entire family), we now have Celebrations and Support Programs.

CELEBRATIONS

A new name for one of our favorite program types, Celebrations are our mid-size programs where the volunteer-to-guest ratio is purposefully smaller. Celebrations invite a more laid-back and relaxed atmosphere and create an opportunity for teens and children to make real connections and discover their commonalities.

SUPPORT PROGRAMS

New in 2022, CCC now partners with other organizations serving children and families to help provide necessary volunteer support for their outreach programs. These Support Programs include programs of all shapes and sizes but are distinct because they are planned by our partner organizations instead of the CCC team. This year CCC's Support Programs were with Los Ninos Primero, where our teens volunteered in their Saturday School and Dia de Los Ninos. We look forward to more Support Program partners in 2023!

FULL STEMM MEMD

CCC is so grateful for the NCR Foundation's support and investment that helped us launch this important initiative!

STEAM Station

Responding to the recommendations of our Advisory Council, made up of agency partner representatives in the community, CCC launched a new STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) initiative at our 2022 programs. Thanks to the support of a \$35,000 grant from the NCR Foundation, CCC was able to provide hands-on STEAM opportunities that encourage the use of imagination, teamwork, engineering, and problemsolving skills through challenging, collaborative, and fun activities.

We provided art projects like sand art requiring specific measurements, engineering projects including building roller coasters out of tubing and marbles, and science experiences such as experimenting with bubbles and making slime. CCC also distributed over 600 age-appropriate STEAM kits, games, and projects for participants to take home with them, strengthening the home-to-school connections for the families we serve.

This year's Amy's Holiday Party included three separate parties, all held on Sunday, December 4. The magic of Amy's Holiday Party is made possible by the efforts of so many people in our community who come together and contribute in countless ways. We think it's the most wonderful day of the year!
